Generational Shift:

With helpful information like the Foundation’s current focus, an awareness of estate planning is shared with church attendees as individuals not

only think about their own legacy and the impact their gift can have on current and future ministry. Such an emphasis highlights the benefits of planning ahead and creating a comprehensive legacy gift to endow ministry into the future.
